Dear Mr. Dozier:

We are writing to you because ETS's Test Security Office is concerned, based on a preliminary review, that there appears to be substantial evidence that your scores on the December 6, 2003 SAT I: Reasoning Test are invalid. As you acknowledged when you registered for the test, ETS has the right to review the validity of test scores, and to cancel questionable scores when we believe there is substantial evidence that they are invalid. The enclosed booklet, Why and How Educational Testing Service Questions Test Scores, provides important information about this process, and we urge you to read it carefully.

Our preliminary concerns are based on a comparison of the handwriting on your answer sheet with the handwriting on other documents such as your registration form and external documents. We received an inquiry from a score user about your test scores. We found that the handwriting on your answer sheet appears to differ from the handwriting on other documents that bear your name. ETS is not accusing you of cheating, but the anomalies noted above raise concerns about the validity of your scores.

Final decisions about whether there is substantial evidence supporting cancellation of test scores are made by three-member panels of ETS's Board of Review. Before the Board of Review considers this matter, you have an opportunity to send us any information that addresses our concerns. Feel free to consult with other people whose judgment you trust, or call us, before deciding what information to send in. We must receive any information you would like the Board of Review to consider by June 28, 2004. Any information we receive by that date, as well as other information about your scores, will be considered by the Board of Review.

After we receive all the information you would like the Board of Review to consider, and if you so request, we will send you (or, in the case of secure test materials, give you an opportunity to examine) copies of the materials that reflect our concerns. Please note that no additional handwriting samples will be accepted after such a request has been fulfilled.

If you choose to submit information concerning the handwriting on your test, you should send us as many items as possible from Section A, and you may also send us any, or all of the items in Section B below. **All documents sent to ETS must predate the test in question. Facsimile documents will not be accepted.**

Section A

- A clear copy of your driver's license or learner's permit or other government issued ID
- A clear copy of your passport signature page.
- Originals of six consecutively numbered canceled checks signed by you.

Section B (In addition, you may submit any or all of these)

- A clear copy of your student ID card.
- A statement describing unusual circumstances related to your handwriting.
- A doctor's note documenting a condition related to your handwriting.
- School assignments containing samples of your handwriting. (Samples with your cursive writing, printing by hand, and written numerals, each with teacher comments, are usually helpful to us.) Please note the school and the name of the teacher who wrote the comments.
- Any other items containing samples of your handwriting or that relate to your handwriting on the SAT I: Reasoning Test.

Documents we have on file and any documents you submit from Section A and B above will be sent to a document examiner. You should submit all of the documents you would like to be considered, but documents not conforming to the requirements stated above will not be sent to a document examiner. The document examiner will prepare a report and we will send a copy of the report to you, upon request after you have submitted the information to the Board of Review. If the document examiner concludes that the handwriting on your answer sheet appears to be yours, your scores will be cleared. Otherwise, the file, including the document examiner's report, will be submitted to the Board of Review.

If you do not wish the Board of Review to consider this matter, you must tell us by June 28, 2004 either that you will take a free retest to confirm your scores (United States and Canada only) or that you would like ETS to cancel your scores and send you a full refund of the test fee.

If any single Board of Review member decides that there is not substantial evidence supporting cancellation of your scores, ETS will clear your scores. If, on the other hand, all three members of the Board of Review panel determine that there is substantial evidence supporting cancellation of your scores, you will be given an opportunity to select any one of the options listed below. These options are described more fully in

- 1) Take a free retest to confirm your scores.
- 2) Tell us to cancel your scores and receive a full refund of the test fee.
- 3) Let the school or agency to which you would like the scores to be sent decide whether to use the scores after ETS cancels them.
- 4) Ask an arbitrator selected by the American Arbitration Association whether the material before the Board of Review constituted substantial evidence that your scores are invalid.

In addition to the options listed above, we acknowledge your legal right to seek judicial review of Board of Review decisions.



Dear Committee:

I am writing to your office concerning Robert L. Dozier, who is currently a senior at Lithonia High School, in the DeKalb County School System. Robert is being heavily recruited for a possible basketball scholarship.

There are some very strong allegations that academic fraud may have occurred with Robert. On the December, 2003 SAT, Robert posted a combined total of 1260. This score is completely out of line with anything Robert has done academically at our school. My suspicions were confirmed when a faculty member mentioned that he was told someone else took the test for Robert. Allegedly, a graduate of our school, took the test for Robert at the North Atlanta High School test center.

Understand that these are allegations only. It is not my job to investigate any of this. As an educator, I felt compelled to report this information to your office. Desperate times sometimes lead to desperate measures. Academic integrity is very important to me. If this case is investigated and Robert is cleared of any wrong doing, then I would be the first to apologize for my suspicions. However, if any of this is true, then Robert and whoever else was involved, should be held accountable. I have chosen to remain anonymous. It is hoped that this situation will be investigated thoroughly, if not by your office, then by the appropriate agency.
