HOW THEY GOT HERE

Survival, not the NCAA Tournament, was on the mind of Vanderbilt’s coaches and players the night of Nov. 28, when a stunning homecourt loss to Furman dropped the Commodores to 1-3 overall. Could they and their oft-criticized coach Kevin Stallings reverse their plummeting fortunes? Vandy fans eager for Stallings’ demise were no doubt counting the days until the school’s administration dispatched him back to the Big Ten country from whence he came. But more rational fans, or anyone who knew basketball, realized the Furman game wasn’t necessarily cause for panic, that it was a perfect storm of an upset brought about by a confluence of factors. First and foremost: The Paladins were coached by Jeff Jackson, who just a few months earlier was sitting on Kevin Stallings bench as a trusted assistant. Jackson had recruited every player on Vandy’s roster, and suffice to say handled the scouting on the game himself. If anyone knew how to beat the Commodores, it was Jackson.

Second, Vanderbilt was still feeling its way after the loss of starting post man **Alan Metcalfe**, who broke a foot in a loss at Wake Forest. Taking a page from the playbook of Tennessee, which a year earlier installed point guard Dane Bradshaw at power forward with surprising success, Stallings decided to replace the massive Metcalfe with guard **Dan Cage**.

The move essentially converted Vanderbilt to a four-guard lineup, but one that wasn’t vertically challenged, given the presence of bookend wings **Derrick Byars**, a 6-7, 230-pound senior, and 6-6 sophomore **Shan Foster**.

After that one-game adjustment period against Furman, the Commodores clicked, winning seven straight before losing to yet another Southern Conference school, Appalachian State, in the finals of the San Juan Shootout.

Similarly, Vanderbilt’s SEC got off to a slow start that could have been disastrous if Foster hadn’t tipped in a Byars miss at the buzzer to give the ’Dores an 82-81 homecourt victory over then 16th-ranked Tennessee. Sandwiched around

that stunning win were a couple of road losses at Auburn and Georgia. Who knows what might have happened if Vanderbilt had started the conference season 0-3? Then came the stretch of games that propelled Vanderbilt into the NCAA Tournament. In succession, the Commodores ripped No. 10 Alabama in Nashville, continued its mastery over No. 25 Kentucky with a surprising win in Lexington, their third straight over the Wildcats, and then whipped No. 21 LSU in Baton Rouge.

After that, the Commodores did what they had to do to secure their at-large bid, overcoming a couple of road-game wipeouts at Tennessee and Mississippi State with a rousing thumping of then No. 1 Florida in Nashville and a fourth straight win over Kentucky.

Put it all together and it spelled Vanderbilt’s second NCAA bid in Stallings eight seasons.

BACKCOURT

A legitimate case could be made that Vanderbilt has the most talented pair of wings in college basketball. Byars and Foster give the ’Dores two long, athletic swingmen that can get their points inside or out, pass, rebound and defend.

It’s long been the opinion of *Blue Ribbon* editors that Foster has the potential to be the most talented player in the SEC, but this season, it was Byars who elevated his game to another level, earning SEC Player-of-the-Year honors from the league’s coaches. Byars has essentially played all five positions in his time at Vanderbilt, but this year he did the most damage from the wing, a position from which he’s the ultimate triple threat, capable of

getting to the basket, pulling up for a three-pointer or setting up teammates to score.

Byars is a first-rate stat-sheet stuffer. Witness the 32-point, seven-rebound, two-assist, two-steal number he laid on South Carolina, or the 24 points, eight assists and five steals he racked up against Florida. Those later two numbers were season highs, and Byars also had a personal-best 12 rebounds against Wake Forest.

“He might be able to do more things on the basketball court than any kid I’ve ever coached,” Stallings said. “He’s got freakish talent. There’s nothing he can’t do. He can defend, he can rebound, he can score, he can pass, he can handle the ball.”

Foster isn’t quite as versatile at Byars, but he can be a more potentially devastating game breaker of a scorer. Foster has continued to improve his game, learning to get to the rim more often to set up his three-point shot and becoming a better defender.

Alex “Red” Gordon, a 5-11 junior, turned in his finest season at the point, shooting around 40 percent from three-point range all year and racking up a better than 2-1 assist-to-turnover ratio.

Gordon is capably supported by 6-3, 207-pound freshman **Jermaine Beal**, who brings great size to the position but has to shoot better from the perimeter and cut down on his turnovers.

FRONTCOURT

The Commodores aren’t the biggest team in the country or even the SEC, but they aren’t tiny either. Call centers **Alan Metcalfe** (6-9, 260) and **Ted Skuchas** (6-11, 250) plodding if you will, but pansies they aren’t. Metcalfe began the season as a starter and was Vanderbilt’s great wide hope as

an inside scorer. But the broken foot he suffered at Wake Forest derailed him, and by the time he was healthy enough to return, the ’Dores had learned to do without him, for the most part.

Still, Metcalfe is a rough and tumble Englishman who won’t take any guff off anyone. And he’s not just a bruiser; Metcalfe can score in the paint and also make free throws.

Skuchas, an intelligent, likeable guy with a taste for classic rock and roll, is not highly skilled, but he can score with a little jump hook and he led Vanderbilt in blocked shots. He blocked four shots each against the beefy front lines of LSU and Alabama, no small factor in those victories.

The key to the frontcourt all season has been the play of LSU transfer **Ross Neltner**, a 6-9, 245-pound junior who started every game and gave Vanderbilt the kind of versatility Stallings needs from the four spot. Neltner led the ’Dores in rebounding, but more important is also a good passer and three-point shooter. He keeps opponents guessing.

Dan Cage is the “power forward” in this mix, but in truth he’s a fourth guard and another game-breaking three-point shooter who put together a 12-game double-figure scoring streak in the middle of the season.

WHEN VANDERBILT WINS

The Commodores have a potentially devastating collection of three-point shooters, and when two or three of them are hot in the same general time frame, they’re capable of burying opponents, and quickly.

Consider five significant victories that, by late February, had staked their claim to an NCAA

bid. Against Georgia Tech, Alabama and Florida at home and LSU and Kentucky on the road, Vanderbilt averaged 10.8 three-pointers per game, making them at a 46-percent clip.

What makes that three-point barrage so effective is that opponents can’t back off any of the starting five; all of them have deep range. And if teams try to guard the Commodores too closely to shut down the three-point threat, that’s when they unleash their backdoor cuts to the basket.

This is a tough, tough team to defend.

BEATING THE COMMODORES

Vanderbilt’s nemesis is superior athleticism, as demonstrated in road setbacks at Tennessee (84-57) and Mississippi State (83-70). Stallings summed up the problem after the latter lopsided loss.

“They’ve got a gear athletically that we don’t have,” Stallings said of the Bulldogs. “They’re quicker, faster, a lot more athletic. We were trying hard. They’ve just got a gear that we don’t have.”

THE FINAL WORD

Vanderbilt has a chance to duplicate the performance of the 2004 team and advance to the Sweet 16. Provided the defensive effort is there, the Commodores have more than enough firepower to overwhelm teams. All five starters can knock down three pointers, which means opposing defenses won’t be able to leave anyone alone. And preparing for Vanderbilt’s motion offense and backdoor cuts won’t be easy with a day to prepare between games.
