HOW THEY GOT HERE

It was almost as if Ernie Kent had his first name legally changed to embattled. Or much-maligned. Indeed, at this time a year ago, his name hardly, if ever, appeared in print without one of those modifiers. Rumors were rampant that Kent—without question the most-accomplished coach in program history—was out after nine seasons.

Kent survived, perhaps behind an upset of Washington in the Pac-10 Tournament. Despite that win, though, the message was clear: This season was Kent’s last chance.

Behind a somewhat soft non-conference slate, outside of a trip to Georgetown, Oregon jumped out to a 12-0 start. Any non-believers were quickly converted when the Ducks knocked UCLA from the unbeaten ranks with a 68-66 win on Jan. 6. At one point, Oregon was 18-1—the program’s best start in 80 years—and ranked No. 7 in the AP poll.

At that point, before losing to Washington on Jan. 25, Oregon appeared the locks of locks for the NCAA Tournament. However, the Ducks made it interesting, losing six-of-eight, including three straight, to Arizona, Cal and Stanford, in mid-February.

Oregon regrouped with a homecourt victory over then 9th-ranked Washington State, then beat Washington. The Ducks’ 10th Pac-10 victory of the season was just a part of a tournament-worthy resumé that included this little factoid: Oregon was the only team in the country to beat three different top 10 teams this year—No. 1 UCLA, No. 10 Arizona and No. 9 Washington State.

BACKCOURT

Before the season began, many thought the key player for Oregon would be 6-6 junior guard **Malik Hairston**, who seem poised for a breakout campaign similar to Washington’s

Brandon Roy last winter.

However, Hairston missed eight games with groin and heel injuries, including the first five, and has actually regressed from his sophomore year. Still, he’s been solid when healthy, averaging around 11 points and six boards and leading the Ducks in field goal percentage.

The player who has been the difference in terms of Oregon’s success is 6-0 senior point guard **Aaron Brooks**. An All-American candidate, Brooks led the Pac-10 in scoring while placing among the leaders in assists, steals and assist-to-turnover ratio. It was huge leap for a guy long considered an underachiever with an attitude problem.

“I think it’s the difference of a guy that has really matured in his fourth year,” Arizona coach Lute Olson said. “Before, in some ways, Brooks was a loose cannon. Now he’s a steadying influence on that team. He’s a great shooter and a great driver, so he’s difficult to contain. The biggest thing is he’s become a great leader.”

Brooks put together a career’s worth of clutch performances in his final season, starting with a November win over Rice where he scored six points in overtime. Brooks tossed in the game-winning jumper against UCLA, made a layup with two seconds left to beat Arizona and scored five points in overtime in the win over Washington State.

For the majority of the season, Oregon has started four perimeter players, including a pair of sharp shooting guards in 6-5 junior Bryce Taylor and 5-6 freshman Tajuan Porter.

Taylor was among the most-improved returning players in the Pac-10, scoring more than 14 points a game and shooting 50 percent from the field. A solid rebounder and especially aggressive on the offensive glass, Taylor has quick hands on defense and can guard the two or three. Porter also averaged around 14 points while leading the conference with three three-pointers made per game.

FRONTCOURT

One of the more underappreciated players in the Pac-10 this season was 6-9 junior Marty Leunen. In the mold of an old-school Princeton big man, Leunen led the Ducks in blocked shots and steals while also knocking down more than a three-pointer per game. He was also second on the squad in assists and led the Pac-10 in defensive rebounds.

For any young player and/or coach wanting a clinic this NCAA Tournament on rebounding, no one—repeat, no one—boxes out better on the defensive end. Not in the Pac-10 mind you, we’re talking in the country.

On those rare occasions when the Ducks go with two post players, 6-8 senior Adam Zahan and 6-6 freshman Joevan Catron share the minutes opposite Leunen.

Zahan is capable of making major contributions when he’s called upon, as evidenced by his 15-point, 11-rebound, three-steal performance in 31 minutes against Mercer. In Pac-10 play, he scored 10 points in an 18-minute stint against USC.

Catron came up with a 17-board game against

Portland. He scored his season high of 15 against Bethune-Cookman.

WHEN OREGON WINS

This can be a highly entertaining team to watch, one that often has five players on the court capable of knocking down a three. In fact, six different players average at least one trey per game. Porter and Brooks combined for more than 150 in the regular season alone.

The Ducks have a unique style, forcing turnovers, running the floor, looking for the open three and rarely looking into the post. Oregon hoists a boatload of three-pointers, too, around 25 per game.

Avoiding foul trouble is also crucial to this team’s success. Kent has relied mostly on an eight-man rotation with Brooks averaging nearly 39 minutes per conference game. This team simply doesn’t function on an NCAA Tournament level without Brooks.

“I’ve got the energy to play 40 minutes,” Brooks told the *Oakland Tribune* in mid-February. “I don’t think about [fatigue]. I block it out. I consider myself special.”

Also worth noting is that outside of Hairston, this is one of the best free-throw shooting teams in the field, with four of the top six scorers at 83 percent or higher. Porter leads the way at 92 percent.

BEATING THE DUCKS

Oregon’s opponents in the Dance are going

to exhaust themselves with film from the late-season slide that included six defeats in eight games. What was different about the Ducks over that stretch as opposed to the legit Final Four contender that started 18-1?

Shooting and defense. Defense and shooting. May sound simplistic, but the numbers speak volumes and then some. Oregon suddenly couldn’t hit a shot outside of six feet and couldn’t stop anyone from penetrating. The majority of the six losses saw opposing teams shoot well above 50 percent.

“That’s something you can live and die by [the jump shot], and teams are letting us do that, to die by it,” Ducks senior Adam Zahn told the *Oregonian* in late February.

THE FINAL WORD

Oregon was the only team in the country this season to beat three top-10 ranked opponents and that list doesn’t even include its road win at Georgetown back in December. On a given night, the Ducks are capable of beating just about anyone.

As for the team’s February slide, three of the five losses were by three points, while another came at UCLA. This was hardly a train wreck.

Any team with road wins at Georgetown, Washington State and Arizona is capable of advancing to at least the Sweet 16. But if the Ducks’ collective shooting eye goes AWOL at the wrong time, it could make for a short trip to the dance.
